Writer's Note



David Davila Book, Music, & Lyrics

Free speech comes at a cost, it is never truly free. Aside from the innocent lives lost in wars, there is the wager that one makes when one speaks out - even in a democratic capitalist society. Sure, we're all legally allowed to speak our opinions without fear of imprisonment, but can the things we say cost us in other ways? Can they cost us our jobs, our social status, our personal and

professional relationships, our future career opportunities? Perhaps a more accurate term for the phrase we've come to associate with the first amendment of the US Constitution would be "Decriminalized Speech." I bring this up, because if a Democracy is supposed to mean everyone's voice is heard, then everyone's voice must be heard in order for Democracies to thrive.

Years ago... at the height of the Obama era, in the center of Bohemia, for a fleeting beautiful moment there was an artsy little Brooklyn cafe and bookshop called Vox Pop where poets, comedians, and musicians took turns expressing their views on life, love, and politics on a revolving open mic for a crowd of eclectic hipsters, academics, and neighborhood regulars. In that magical time I sat in the corner drinking Brooklyn Lagers and reveling in the wonder that was New York City; post-9/11, post-housing crash. I was inspired by everything and everyone back then and I got it in my head that one day I'd write about that little cafe, which closed in 2010 due mostly to the recession. Vox Pop sounded like the perfect name for a musical, but what would it be about? As much as I loved that spot, I didn't think a piece about a struggling cafe was worthy of such a grand title. Instead, I decided this musical should be about the very thing the cafe was trying to celebrate in the first place; democracy. Afterall, Vox Populi translates to "the voice of the people," and something about that idea sounded epically musical to me. Over the next few years I started several different versions of the show with various plots, each of which stunk more than the previous. I even shared a version of an act one at Musical Theatre Factory where it was completely eviscerated by my peers and colleagues. I was stuck - and defeated - and decided to put the project on hold indefinitely as I wrote other shows and developed my craft.

Flash forward to 2020, when memes and articles about democracy were circulating the internet. I stumbled upon Tytler's Theory of the Cycles of Democracy and my mind was blown. Could this be true? Is there an easy-to-see cycle that we could somehow prevent from happening to our own country? I set out to research Alexander Tytler only to quickly find that there isn't really anything written about him or his theory of the cycles of democracy. The entire thing sounds more like an urban legend; a myth, a religious belief that if we knew how to stop democracies from failing, the world could finally live in peace. Ureka! I had a new plot for Vox Pop: a group of zealots believe so strongly in the Tytler cycle that they risk their lives to pass on this knowledge. But was I risking my own life in passing on this knowledge?

You probably haven't heard, but there's been a bit of controversy on campus surrounding the plot of this musical, with some folk calling it "Un-American" due its tagline "Post-Democratic." If any of the events in this show seem to echo reality that is only because history tends to repeat itself. In fact, this show seems to exist as a Rorschach test; allowing people to draw their own references to each scenario therein. To be clear, my intention in writing this piece has never been a call to end democracy, but rather a call to celebrate it and ensure its protection for generations to come. For whatever fault anyone finds in the accuracy of the Tytler cycle many things about it ring true. When corruption gets hold of a government, which the cycle claims is inevitable, it gets harder and harder to speak freely. One must wager the worth of their opinion with what they stand to lose if they speak their mind. It has become apparent to me in this process that in writing about controversial issues, as I often do, I stand to lose career opportunities, friends and family, and even be blacklisted. And yet, perhaps I believe naively in the hope that the Tytler cycle offers to democracies; a hope that if we educate each other and speak out against corruption, the world can one day truly live in peace.

As this is my M.F.A. thesis production I'd like to take this space to thank: my parents for their support, my advisor Ana Candida Carneiro, my cohort: Annalise Cain & Jayne Deely, dramaturgs Sarah Johnson, Lexi Silva, & Chris Mills, my thesis committee - Jenny Lale, Lauren Haughton-Gillis, & Diana Grisanti, & my collaborators Maggie Jackson, Katie Cowan Sickmeier, Nicholas Gwin, Andrew Hopson, Erik Wakar, Em Singleton, Aerin Webber, and everyone involved in making this show happen. Lastly, thank you Lauren Diesch for your vision, leadership, and friendship these last three years! <3



The Tytler Cycle

This pop-political theory circulates the internet each election cycle, with different components highlighted depending on the dominant political ideology. The quotation, misattributed to 18th-century Scottish historian Alexander Fraser Tytler, theorizes the inevitable downfall of every democracy.

"A democracy is always temporary in nature; it simply cannot exist as a permanent form of government. A democracy will continue to exist up until the time that voters discover that they can vote themselves generous gifts from the public treasury. From that moment on, the majority always votes for the candidates who promise the most benefits from the public treasury, with the result that every democracy will finally collapse due to loose fiscal policy, which is always followed by a dictatorship.

The average age of the world's greatest civilizations from the beginning of history has been about 200 years. During those 200 years, these nations always progressed through the following sequence: From bondage to spiritual faith; From spiritual faith to great courage; From courage to liberty; From liberty to abundance; From abundance to selfishness; From selfishness to complacency; From complacency to apathy; From apathy to dependence; From dependence back into bondage."

The quote first appeared in a 1943 speech by Henning W. Prentiss, Jr., former president of the National Association of Manufacturers, delivered at a 1943 convocation of the General Alumni Society of the University of Pennsylvania. The "Tytler Cycle" was popularized in an opinion piece circulating the internet after the 2000 US presidential election. Each election pundits claim the collapse of democracy is imminent and either slipping into either "apathy" or "dependence".


