Director's note



I am so grateful for the opportunity to make plays.

As a member of a marginalized community where one person or a few people's decisions can impact our wholeness, I feel so invigorated by the freedom to tell stories like *The Winter's Tale—* a story where one person's actions impact the whole.

What we do, every single day, has the possibility of impacting others around us. And that can be for the good or for the bad. Everything from how we drive, when we show up or not, how

we vote, what we say no or yes to, can impact others. That's what happens with Leontes in this play. His insecurities, imagination, perceptions and ideas destroy his marriage, ultimately causing one child to die of a broken heart as he banishes another. His decisions and actions damage his friendships and weigh on his conscience for sixteen years. But there is good news.

The good news is that redemption is possible when he takes accountability for his actions and genuinely regrets his decisions. And with that, the magic happens and some of what he lost is found again. There is a light at the end of *The Winter's Tale* and along the way we meet a bear, Time talks to us about its impact on all of our lives and, lucky for us, our production also has IU contemporary dancers, choreographed by Katelyn Connor (KC Lin), who create an environment filled with movement, hope and beauty.

Shakespeare is not just for one type of person or group of people. His plays have been around for centuries, inspiring audiences because they tell the truth. He didn't sugarcoat humanity; the truest parts of who we are. And if we let go of any preconceived notions about Shakespeare, at least for two and a half hours, even in the moments that make us uncomfortable, there is light there.

The Winter's Tale was written around 1611 but its themes still resound with relevancy and truth. The plight of women around the world can still be seen or read from the women in Tehran, Iran who are protesting mandatory veiling to those of us here in the U.S. who have been told that we do not have the right to choose our own healthcare. And the magic in which we seek refuge may not come in the form of being turned into a statue but instead in the movements we see by women who risk it all to speak up for what is right every single day around the globe.

I am so grateful for strong women like my mother, Janet White, who was a constant reminder that life moves on, hope is always there and beauty exists. And that's what I hope audiences experience with this production.

Thank you for watching this show to anyone who is here in the audience today.

Thank you to everyone who participated in the work of bringing this show to the stage.

But, mostly, thank you to those who speak up and tell the truth—always.

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






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Tribute to Ann Harmeier

Indiana University is commemorating the life of one of its former students—theater major Ann Harmeier—in observance of the 45th anniversary of her death.

Ann was a 20-year-old junior from Cambridge City, Indiana, who was traveling back to campus when she disappeared after her car broke down on September 12, 1977. Her body was found five weeks later in a nearby cornfield.

Ann's penchant for performing started at an early age. She and two friends formed a singing trio in elementary school that lasted through high school, and she starred in local musicals *South Pacific* and *West Side Story*.

But it was at IU where Ann blossomed. She performed in *Anything Goes* and played a green singing inchworm—Michaelinchelo—in a children's play called *Piffany*. Ann was always happy to pitch in regardless of the task, serving as the prop master in *The Fantasticks* at the time of her disappearance.

Ann's kindness and generosity were her hallmarks. Ann especially loved performing for children, and she also volunteered at Bloomington's Middle Way House and was active in various social causes around campus. During the search to find her, the media called Ann "everyone's daughter."

Ann had unlimited potential and embodied the true spirit of IU with her grace, generosity and passion.

IU is dedicated to preserving Ann's memory and helping to solve her cold case. We hope that you will join us in honoring and celebrating her beautiful life.


